ACTION: EHE (Elective Home Education) numbers to be on all agenda going forward

52a **Overall Effectiveness**

- Self-evaluation continues to deliver a 'good' judgement
- Small number of students presenting with challenging behaviour. Swift action from staff proving effective

52b **Quality of Education Summary**

Curriculum

- WHA has returned to a 3-year KS3
- Agreed curriculum structure for KS4 2022/2023 onwards is in place
- The curriculum flexes and adapts to the changing needs of the community
- EBacc entry for 2024 cohort above 50% and WHA has a clear, moral purpose regarding what is right for the students
- Leaders act swiftly with teaching concerns to provide support
- Improvement seen with progress rates and gaps are closing across faculty areas
- Phonics taught by experts to the lowest 20% of readers

Standards

- Monitoring and evaluation completed by all subject leaders
- 754 monitoring and evaluation records have been completed since September
- A Science deep dive has taken place. Positive feedback was received and all identified issues were addressed immediately
- EBacc entry 2022 is 31.1% (National 37.4%)
- P8 is -0.32. This is below 2021 (0.24)
- A8 is 43.00. This is below 2021 (48.44) and National 2021 (50.67)
- Basics 4+ forecast is 53.8%, Basics 5+ is 38.2%, both below National
- From a cohort of 238 (108 girls & 130 boys), 96 are high ability, 109 are Middle Ability and 26 are Low Ability (7 do not have a KS2 score)

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- SEND cohort of 33 and 4 students with an EHCP
- DA cohort of 89:
 - Basics 4+: 48.3%
 - Basics 5+: 32.6%
 - EBacc entry: 23.6%
 - A8: 42.873
 - P8: -0.42

C: (KF) We have received positive feedback via pupil voice from the phonics classes Q: (VT) Have you seen a marked difference in reading with the inclusion of Hull KR?

KF: We have seen an improvement in some of the more reluctant, but we also have those children who cannot read at all. We have secured funding for another year for a phonics TA

Q: (VT) With Pete Stallard securing an SLT position, what was the impact in that department?

KF: We have a very experienced Head of English and the transition was smooth

Q: (VT) As SLT, do you feel your strategies are working? How does the data inform the decision making?

KF: The decisions are made with the information from the data – what happens in the classroom and curriculum line management discussions take place

Q: (VT) Do you control which subjects undergo deep dives?

MB: Yes, we are the ones asking for them

C: (VT) Triangulation in Teaching & Learning is through MED reports, extended deep dives, dropins by the QTLA Team, senior leadership drop-ins and finally, governor link visits. All of this is supported by student voice surveys

ACTION: MB to add deep dives to the shared area on Teams

SEND

- There are currently 35 students with an EHCP and 14 awaiting assessment
- The highest incidence of SEND is in moderate learning difficulty (MLD) at 20.32% and continues to be above National (17.96%)
- 42 students with primary autism needs. 52 students in total with autism diagnosis (3.23% of the student population)
- Additional SENDCo TA secured for 4 terms

C: (VT) Again, it's important to note as governors we understand triangulation of the SEND performance is through MED reports, the Headteacher termly report, internal performance management meeting groups and governor link visits

LAC Update

- There are currently 13 LAC on roll
- 6/13 are making good academic progress

52c Behaviour & Attitudes Summary

- Behaviour Strategy to be shared with governors
- Academy attendance in line with National and is discussed at each SLT meeting to ensure continued focus
- PA has fallen across all key cohorts
- Punctuality remains a key issue
- A significant reduction in FTEs seen in HT 3
- 52% of suspensions are PP, 27% are SEND
- 3 Permanent Exclusions so far this academic year
- 45 suspensions for swearing at staff
- AP remains stable at 35 students. 21 attend Aspire, 6 attend Compass & 8 attend Rise Academy. 25 of the 35 are SEND
- 1 student returned to WHA after a failed managed move
- 2 x Yr10 students have had successful managed moves to the 14-16 College
- Regular parental meetings are taking place to reiterate expectations and implement a range of behaviour modifications
- 14 students monitored with Tracking Cards

Signed by the Chair:

- Golden Ticket reward proving very popular
- 35 students have signed up for the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme
- C: (IF) Our strategy of going into the shopping centre and hurrying them along each morning is working well. We don't go in to chastise, we gently nudge them. This has greatly reduced lates C: (AH) I think the Tutor Lesson needs to be renamed to Lesson 1 as they don't put much importance on it
- C: (MB) We can definitely build that into next year's plan
- O: (VT) How do you decide which strategies to use?
- IF: ASCL, talking to others to see what has worked for them. It's also important to note behaviour is not yet where we want it to be and there is still a lot of work to be done
- C: (VT) I can see SLT don't have a scattergun approach, they are very focussed and we are seeing results, especially with behaviour
- C: (MB) We also have a guicker turnaround time from periods of challenging behaviour
- C: (VT) The brand identity message is out there now and that will strengthen the message that certain behaviour is non-negotiable
- Q: (DB) What has been the impact on the 3 PEx on the wider school?
- MB: They've had huge positive impact, the year teams can now focus on positives. Luckily there has been no ripple effect from 2 of them
- C: (IF) The impact from the Golden Ticket initiative has been huge. We even have students asking if they can choose the next set of prizes

ACTION: MB to upload Behaviour Strategy to Teams

Termly highlights include:

Year 8 Football - the team finished 2nd in their Hull schools league and are through to the semi-final of the Hull school's trophy with an excellent 3-1 win away to Kingswood.

Year 9 Football - the team were very unlucky to lose their first game 2-1. Fixtures against Kelvin Hall, Malet Lambert and a quarter final cup game against St Marys are due to take place in the coming weeks.

Year 9 & 10 Girls Football – the team attended the Hull Schools Football Tournament, finishing top of their league and remaining undefeated.

Inclusive Table Cricket - two teams took part in the Hull and East Riding Schools tournament at St Marys. WHA B team came second in their group and A team won the full tournament and will now represent Hull and the East Riding at the Yorkshire Finals to be held at Headingly Cricket Ground after

Rookie Lifeguard and swimming club - due to demand WHA has had to put on an extra night and now has 60 pupils regularly attending and developing their first aid, personal survival and lifesaving

Year 8 Rugby League - the team finished 1st in their Yorkshire Cup group with wins against teams from Kirklees and Wakefield and as a result qualified for National Cup as one of 4 Yorkshire representatives and the Yorkshire cup semi-final. They lost a close game in the National cup last 16 to a strong side from Wigan.

Year 9 Rugby League - the team finished 1st in their Yorkshire Cup group with wins against teams from Halifax and Leeds and as a result qualified for the National Cup as one on 4 Yorkshire representatives and the Yorkshire cup semi-final. Due to play away in Wigan in the last 16 of the National Cup.

Year 10 Rugby League - the team finished 1st in their Yorkshire Cup group and as a result qualified for the National Cup as one on 4 Yorkshire representatives. They will travel to Wales in the quarter finals. They also beat Castleford Academy 30-20 in the Yorkshire cup semi-final and will play Spen Valley in the final at Featherstone Rovers on Tuesday 29th March.

Rugby Scholarships - WHA is delighted to have had two Year 10 pupils sign scholarship U16 contracts with Hull KR to and a further two have signed for Castleford Tigers 2 Year 11 pupils also made their debuts for Hull KR Ladies' team.

- 2 mentors in place geography & maths

AH & VT attended a pupil behaviour & reintegration panel and conducted a culture & climate visit on 08 April 2022. Both of these visits are linked to the Academy development Plan Priority 4 of improving the culture & climate of the Academy to enhance attendance & behaviour

Culture & Climate: VT noted any contradictions against acceptable behaviour, no matter how 'small' they seemed, were dealt with immediately. Throughout break periods, a well-managed and practiced process of pupil management was observed and calm and order was seen despite large pupil numbers coming together

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Pupil Reintegration Panel: 3 pupils were integrating back into the school after a period of home schooling due to negative behaviours.
